
ISC Invites **Two Champs**





CLEARWATER, FIA. (By Bob McCollough with valuable assists from Greg Nichols of Clearwater Times and Bill White of Clearwater Sun -- pictures from the Times) — This year an atmosphere of confidence prevails throughout the Bomber organization because of the selection of Virgil Rice as president, Steve Samuels as business manager, plus an effective board of directors, working in close harmony with knowledgeable Field Manager Wayne Dees, Mike Hazel (MVP) as schedule manager, and a wealth of talented players, in spite of the tough est schedule in several years. No proof is needed to show the abilities of Manager Wayne Dees and his long-time associate, Richie Ryals. They are at this time (Feb. 6) conducting gruelling tryouts three times a week to select the best team to represent the Bombers in a long time, who have

New Zealand will have a month of spring training in California before the world tournament." (It is reported the Kiwis will be guests of Tom Morris, owner of the ISC champs, Chameleons of Lancaster, Calif.) "They treated us very nicely when we were in Japan," Kellett said, "and we would like to do the same for them." Approximately 26 teams in a double-knockout. (3) Junior men's national championships, Aug. 15-19 at St. Catharines, Ontario. St. Catharines is also located in the Niagara peninsula, approximately 10 miles east of Grimsby. (4) Junior ladies at Moncton, New Brunswick, Aug. 15-19. (5) Senior ladies at Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 21-26. (6) Senior man, Fredericton, New Brunswick, Aug. 28-Sept. 2.... In 1983 the Ontario junior men's was woh by Binbrook, Ontario, and then finished second at nationals. Nova Scotia won its third straight title. The Ontario junior ladies was won by Kitchener Waterloo Civitons over

SOUTH BEND BENDIX BRAKES WIN 1941 ASA

MEN'S TITLE, DEFEAT ROANOKE, N.C., 9-0;

IKE BIERWAGEN, STAN CORGAN STAND OUTS

DETROIT, MICH., Sept. 15,

Brakes, world's champions of softball, will return to South Bend, Ind., tonight, bringing with them a \$1,000 trophy acquired before 15,-000 spectators in the University of Detroit stadium Sunday Afternoon. Title to the trophy

was acquired by defeating Roanoke Rapids, N.C., 9-0, in championship game of the Amateur Softball Association's eighth annual tournament. Big Ike Bierwagen, who received

credit for winning the championship game, has a season hurling record of 28 victories and only one defeat. Stan Corgan, hurled three games in this tournament and season recprd was 27-2....By winning the Brakes realized a goal of seven years! standing. A year ago they reached the finals only to be defeated by Kodak Park of Rochester, N.Y., 1-0. Four years ago the Brakes advanced to the semi-finals in Chicago before losing to Briggs. Only twice during this tournament did the Brakes display signs of pressure. In game with Peoria, Ill., Caterpillars, Bierwagen hurled no-hit ball, but had to go extra innings to win because of two costly errors which allowed the Caterpillars to score two runs. In the Pontiac, Mich. game Len Murray and Bierwagen went 12 innings to win because of errors once more allowed opponents to score unearned runs.... The man who kept the Brakes on road to victory was Vince Piotrowski. Practically through because of injuries to legs, Photrowski found his hitting eye in final two games, clicking off five safe blows, one a home run, to drive in four counters.... Balanced pitching also figured in the Bendix success. Bierwagen and Corgan each worked three games while Len Murray of Fort Wayne Zollners started two contests and finished one. FRED HOFFMAN, PIONEER

ST. JOSEPH, MO.: - Fred Hoffman, one of the pioneers of the Amateur Softball Assn., passed away Feb. 11, at a local hospital. Mr. Hoffman, known as Mr. YMCA...Mr. Softhall ... Mr. OF ASA, DIES AT AGE 83 Kiwanis...Mr. St. Joseph, had been involved with the ASA since

its founding in 1933. Mr. Hoffman served as the Missouri ASA commissioner all those 50 years and was the only commissioner the state ever had, and was one of the first inducted into the ASA's Hall of Honor. Mr. Hoffmansered as national ASA president from 1962-1963 and was chairman of the appointments committee and a former member of the International Joint Rules Committee. He also was the national YMCA's representative on the ASA national council. He was a past president of the Kiwanis Club of St. Joseph, held the position of club secretary 1939-1974 and was honored for his 35-year tenure when he resigned in 1974 and was awarded with life membership. An executive director of St. Joseph YMCA, he was instrumental in helping to raise \$3.1 million for the new Family YMCA. He was named membership secretary in 1927 and served in many positions until he was named executive director in 1949, and retired in 1980. He was very active in the Masonic lodge and honored with 33 degree, and a member and deacon of First Baptist church. Survivors include his wife, Juanita, two sisters, Mildred Letovsky of Omaha, Neb., and Margaret Guyer of Glendale, Calif. "I don't know of anybody in the United States who had more of an impact on softball at the national, state and local level," said Dennis Christgen, treasurer of the committee which is coordinating this summer's national fastpitch tournament for major men's teams here in St. Joseph. Mr. Christgen sponsors the Walnut/Woods team here that will host that national tournament. "Fred was a great person," states Carl P. Kelley of Omaha, Neb., metro ASA commissioner of that area and one of the top promoters of the sport in that area and the country. "He would do anything for softball, for those he served as director of the St. Joseph WMCA, and those Masonic friends he served as potentate," Kelly recalled. "Fred appointed me to the ASA membership committee as chairman when he was elected ASA national president. I accepted the appointment with the understanding it would be a working committee. Fred agreed, and as the records indicate, the ASA has grown every year since - and Fred lived to enjoy much of that growth - each year that followes. It was an honor to me to work with such a great man. Both Lola and I will miss Fred very much," concluded Kelley in a statement to The Bulletin.

PREPARE FOR SUCCESSFUL SEASON

AN IDEAL UMPIRE NOTICES EVERY-

THING, BUT HE'S SELDOM NOTICED

GOLDEN VALLEY, MINN. (By Les Novak, Minnesota Umpire-in-Chief) - As the season approaches and during the questions that are always asked of umpires, some of the answers are merely quotes from the rule book. However, of major importance are the questions that we as umpires can ask of ourselves: Am I improving as an umpire, compared to other seasons? Am I correcting faults? Am I exerting every effort to perform the job expected? Am I taking a "let's-get-it-over" attitud@? Am I the "big boss" on the field? Am

I careless in my personal appearance? Am I just under the wire in my arrival at the games? Am I forgetting to review the rules? Am I "hard-headed" regarding interpretations? Am I using my opinion as the one and only? Am I disrespectful when asked questions? Am I continually controlling my temper? Am I assuming a "distator attitude?" Am I beyond being convinced I may be wrong? Am I attending interpretation clinics? Am D cooperating with my fellow umpires? Am I always alert to cover all situations? Am I keeping in good physical condition? Am I always prepared with the necessary equipment? Am I satisfied to let the game lag? Am I mentally equipped to accept the responsibility expected of me? Am I firm in my decisions? Am I provoking antagonism when enforcing the rules?....Not all umpires improve. A good number keep their faults, resent constructive criticism, are unwilling to learn and have been lax in studying the rules. Many umpires assume they are infallible in their judgments and regard their opinions as final, not alone in softball, but various other subjects. When asked questions, they sometimes treat the questioner with contempt. T ey often lose their temper and assum dictatorial attitudes. They are never convinced that perhaps they may be wrong. A lack of cooperation amoun umpires is prevalent in too many instances. Not being alert in many cases is the underlying cause of this lack of cooperation. Use the off-season to take inventory. Make your corrections and adjustments now! Eliminate your faults before the season starts. You will find umpiring can be a sport and not a chore.

.... Read the following once in awhile; it is important to the game as well as yourselves ... An Ideal umpire notices everything, but seldom is noticed themselves! They have resourcefulness and initiative. They have dignity of voice and manner, but no suggestion of pompousness! They are considerate and courteous without sacrificing firmness. They can control the players effectively and understandingly. They have constant concern for the welfare of the players. They cooperate fully with fellow umpires. They are physically able to be, and is, in the right place at the right time. They know what the rules say and what the rules mean.... One additional tip: Younger umpires look to the veterans for advice. Be fair in your observations, your advice will influence a rookie umpire's attitude toward the game. Help them along. Remember, you, too, were assisted at one time during your career....After the ASA commissioners council concluded in Albuquerque last month (January) I had a chance to take a short side trip to El Paso, Texas, and Juarez, Memico. While in El Paso, I had a chance to talk to Frank Porth, ISC treasurer and umpire-in-chief about fastpitch and the new 1985 pitching rule concerning one foot on the rubber. Mr. Porth feels as I do, that the new rule will aid the umpire and perhaps encourage some young players to try pitching. It certainly won't hurt the game. If you have an opinion, please write me about your thoughts about the rule this year. We'll see if they match up with the opinions after the rule goes into effect in 1985. That's it for this month. MIDLAND, MICH. (By Chad Roberts, Midland Daily News Sports Writer) - A tournament record of 15 teams will journey into Midland this summer to take part in the sixth men's World Tournament Championships, July 6-14 at the Emerson P rk Currie Stadium. The tournament promises to showcase some of the top. fastpitch talent in the world. The United States is the reigning champion, with McArdles Pontiac/Cadillac of Midland taking the world championship in 1980 at Tacoma, Wash. The 1984 United States squad

will be represented by the Franklin Cardinals of West Haven, Conn., the 1983 ASA champions and managed by John Anquillarre. The Cardinals' top pitcher, Owen Walford, is a familiar name to people in Midland area. Walford was a standout hurler for the Mc-Ardles squad in 1980. These sessions last two cram-filled days of instruction, starting at 8 a.m. Each participant pays his own registration fee of \$45 and is responsible for his ob her own transportation and housing during the sessions. ISC INVITES CHAMPS (From Page 1) championship teams. The thinking behind the invi-

tations is that those teams are worthy of a berth in the ISC world tournament because they have won a legitimate and recognized national championship. The ISC recognizes the two teams that win these championships as two of the best men's fastpitch teams in the world.... The ISC, in conjunction with the Allentown Patriots and under the sponsorship of the Stroh Brewery Co., will conduct its 38th annual tournament this August in Allentown. The tournament will bring together over 40 of the best teams in the world, including defending champion Lancaster, Calif., Chameleons, the winner last year at Bakersfield, Calif. The Chameleons, and the host team, Allentown Patriots, along with the Canadian and ASA champs have been extended invitations to participate. All other teams must qualify by winning anISC area tournament or one of the 14 ISC-affiliated travel leagues in U.S. (12) and Canada (2). One of the highlights of the tournament could be the appearance of home-town favorite Ty Stofflet, whom many fastpitch observers believe to be the best left-handed pitcher in history of game. There is only one catch - Stofflet must pitch his Reading, Pa., Bank of Pennsylvania Sunners to the championship of Vice President Bob Walsh's Pennsylvania area tourney. (Note: Stofflet's team, plus several other staunch ASA teams, Like Decatur, Ill., ADM, and Clearwater, Fla., Bombers, will be trying for the first time to participate in the ISC program, which should make this the very best ever staged by the ISC.) It's a good bet Stofflet will give it his best shot, for he, who started as a youngster in a uniform of the Allentown Patriots under the management of Earl Hunsicker (this year's tournament director), will be inducted into the ISC Hall of Fame, along with former Aurora, Ill., Home Savings pitcher Dick Brubaker and ISC administrator Royce Heath of A lington, Texas, during opening ceremonies. Hunsicker and his sons Glen and Don, are striving to make this the best tournament ever staged by the ISC. Their organization, the Patriots, is dedicated to the youth of Allentown. The Hunsickers and Patriots conducted a very successful ASA men's national tournament at Bicentennial Park in 1976. (That opened the Bicentennial park, built for the youth of Allentown through funds raised primarily by Earl Hunsicker.) Bob Walsh, ISC eastern vice president and the organization's senior umpire, has also been an instrumental influence in bringing the ISC tournament to Pennsylvania, the easternmost state to host the meet. The ISC meet has been held in Illinois 13 times, California, nine; Arizona, four and Wisconsin, four. It was first ventured east of the Mississippi as recently as 1981 under the direction of Art Gillis (now Florida commissioner) at Saginaw, Mich. Appleton/Kimberly will host it in 1985. The International Softball Congress evolved from two organizations, the National Softball Congress (formed by Larry Walker of Phoenix, A iz,) and the International Softball League. Carrol Forbes, who served as the chief executive officer until his death in 1982, helped form the NSC in 1947 to promote men's fastpitch to its highest competitive level (and because he and Larry Walker did not agree with the direction of the ASA at that time.) Forbes broke away from the NSC in 1950 and founded the International Fastball League, which became the ISC in 1958 (when Walker and the NSC faded out of the picture.) Following Forbes' death, Milt Stark, a former ISC World all-star catstar catcher with the 10-time world champion Long Beach, Calif., Nitehawks Doing Well and secretary under Forbes, was elected executive director. Under Stark's leadership, the ISC continues to grow and prosper. Stark, who works out of the ISC headquarters office in Anaheim Hills, Calif., is highly optimistic in his forecast for the Allentown tournament. "Due to the generous sponsorship of the Stroh Brewery Co., and the softball tournament expertise of the Allentown Patriot organization, this should be the biggest and most competitive fastpitch softball tournament ever staged. (Stroh beer is the official beer of the 1984 ISC world tournament. Stroh also owns Schlitz and Schaefer brewing companies.)

WILL PROVIDE FREE ROOMS, LAUNDRY FOR TEAMS

BAKERSFIELD, CALIF. (By Betty Stout) — Frank Lowder, sponsor of Lowder Electric Class A team of this city, bid on and won the right to stage the Men's ASA Class A national tournament here in '85.
